General Plan Overview

What is a General Plan?


- Long range planning document
- Blueprint or constitution for physical development in a community
- Addresses a comprehensive list of issues
- Contains goals, policies, programs, and land use
 & circulation diagrams

General Plan Overview

Why Prepare a General Plan?

- Legal requirement
- Information base
- Community vision
- Clear development standards
- Intergovernmental coordination
- Citizen involvement
- Implementation guide
- Conflict resolution

General Plan Overview



Basic Content Requirements

- Comprehensive
 - Geographic
 - Issues
- Long-term (timeframe)
- Internally consistent (horizontal consistency)
 - Equal status among elements
 - Consistency among elements
 - Consistency within elements
 - Area plan consistency
 - Text and diagram consistency

Mandatory elements

- The Land Use Element designates the general distribution and intensity of all uses of land in the community. This includes residential uses, commercial uses, industrial uses, public facilities, and open space, among others.
- The Circulation Element identifies the general location and extent of existing and proposed major transportation facilities, including major roadways, rail and transit, and airports. It also addresses utilities
- The Housing Element is a comprehensive assessment of current and projected housing needs for all segments of the community and all economic groups that also embodies policies and programs for providing adequate housing.

Mandatory elements (continued)

- The Conservation Element addresses the conservation, development, and use of natural resources including water, forests, soils, rivers, and mineral deposits.
- The **Open Space Element** details plans and measures for preserving open space for wildlife habitat, agricultural and timber lands, parks, trails, and scenic vistas, among other open space uses.
- The Noise Element identifies noise problems and includes policies to protect the community from excessive noise.
- The **Safety Element** establishes policies and programs to protect the community from risks associated with seismic, geologic, flood, wildfire, and other hazards.

Shoe fits provision

 CA Government Code Section §65301(c) provides that each State-mandated element need address only those issues that are relevant to the county's planning area and at a level of detail that reflects local conditions.


General Plan Update Documents

	Baseline Report =	Snapshot of where the county is
		todav

- Issues & Opportunities = Identifies range of concerns and choices
- Vision Statement = Paints a picture of the county
 25 years in the future
- Alternatives Report = Provides different paths/ways to achieve the vision
- Policy Document = Plan to achieve the vision
 - Environ. Impact Report = Identifies problems and suggests ways to minimize or eliminate impacts
